COUNTY AIR AMBULANCE CLOTHING RECYCLING BANKS

The Parish Council have recently agreed, on a trial basis, to site a clothing and shoe recycling bank at the Parish Hall recycling centre. The bank will be supplied and emptied by Staffordshire Textiles. The aim is to raise funds for the work of the County Air Ambulance Service. The Service has been in operation for 14 years and during that time have completed 19166 missions within the 11 midland counties. They need to raise approximately £2.4million each year to continue to run the service. So if you have any old clothes or shoes just pop along to the Parish Hall and drop them into the appropriate receptacles.

REMEMBRANCE DAY SERVICE

The ALL faith Remembrance Day Service will once again be held in the Parish Hall on the Sunday 13 November 2005 at 3.00 pm.

Although every year is one of special significance, this one is just that little bit more so because it celebrates the 60th Anniversary of the end of the war in Japan, VJ Day, on the 15 August 1945. This was the final end of conflict in the Second World War and one which to those involved appeared to come and go without the recognition that their suffering inflicted upon them by a particularly cruel enemy deserved, but one which played no less a part or importance than VE day.

I believe that on this day we should also remember those of all faiths who were massacred in London on 7 July this year. They were, in the eyes of those whose twisted reasoning and justification for this atrocity the enemy and make us feel that we are under attack from an enemy within, who wear no uniform of recognition. We should all be praying that this will not escalate into another long and bloody conflict as others have and some still ongoing.

Remembrance Day is no longer just about its original concept, it is about all conflict wherever death is the result, for people who give their lives to fight for what is considered to be, and not always by them, a just cause. We should never forget any of them, by remembering it might in some way help prevent it happening all over again.

So please give just an hour of your time on SUNDAY, 13 NOVEMBER 2005 AT 3.00 PM

that all will be well, to even get a reply from them is quite an achievement, so fingers crossed. I'd like to thank Melton Borough Council's Land Drainage Officer Sadia Moeed for overseeing this project and for always being prepared to keep the Parish Council informed and to even ask us questions if she thought our input would help, this doesn't happen very often. David Murray and Matthew O'Callaghan both worked hard at the time the flooding took place and without them having a big input to gaining grant aid, this project, like some of the other town ones, might never have been started, let alone finished. Also a big thank you to the contractors G.F. Tomlinsons who were also prepared to involve the Parish Council and ask for our opinions and for finishing on time. Finally a reminder to Valley Residents no more traffic cones in the brook please, 10 were removed during construction, and it is for your own benefit not ours, so the ball is in your court, NOT the brook, please!!

Council Taxes will undoubtedly have to rise again in the coming year and in the main this will nearly all be down to the mindless vandalism that has been taking place in the past few weeks, by the few that most communities seem to be afflicted with and generally those whose parents could not care less where they are or what they are doing and are, very often, the only ones who don't know or aren't prepared to admit that their offspring need sorting out. One week, late July, I was in touch with the police HQ at Enderby, you can't get in touch with Melton, the 0116 2222222 people every day of the week over vandalism that was taking place at the Parish Hall. Double glazed windows being smashed, guttering ripped down, the Ball Stop fence behind one of the goals being systematically destroyed, one of our garage roofs smashed, waste bins in the Country Park fired (these will not be replaced). All in all £3000 worth of damage that you are going to be asked to pay for. We have had young adults, not youngsters, on the roof at the Parish Hall and IT Centre at midnight, most of this taking place with the visit of a white 106 Peugeot car, complete with occupants, some from Melton, some local, up to 9 at times. We have also had problems with 3 irresponsible 'L' Plate Scooter drivers performing what they see as death defying driving feats in Riverside Walk, one of these damaging one of the residents property. Keep your eyes open, because if we give way to this type of behaviour we might as well give up altogether.

Report anything you find unacceptable to the police on 0116 2222222. I've been helped an awful lot by local parishioners over a lot of these problems who have done just that, we might not get much of a response from the police but its a reported crime or concern and in the very long run builds up even to them a problem that needs to be tackled.

THE PARISH FIELD PAVILION

Asfordby Village F.C. will this season be returning to play on the village playing field, because of the state of the parish pavilion they have had to play wherever they could get a pitch, this turned out to be a Melton Town Estate pitch on Morleys Hill but now due to a Melton team wishing to play there, they have been asked to leave, so despite seemingly not being eligible for any grant aid it was decided to refurbish the pavilion. It had become so run down, vandalised outside and, at one stage, inside windows smashed, some by golf balls, that the team were told that it was in such a bad state that they would not be allowed to compete in their chosen league. The rating department in Leicester thought that it was in such a state that they might consider not charging any rates for it but, of course, they did, they were that bad, although the planning officers at Melton Borough Council insist, without even seeing them, that our facilities are adequate but for what? Now after a lot of hard work and some of it voluntary the pavilion looks something to be proud of both inside and out and even envied by some of the teams coming here to play, that in itself will be a first. Knowing some of the team as I do I can see some might consider moving in permanently, although I'll be interested to see what state its left in after not just the first wet match, but the first of any type of weather. I think we should ask Melton Borough Council again if it is prepared to make a contribution from our only and ever developer contribution, what a farce they are. Still Santa Claus might just bring a brown paper envelope, he might not, of course. But whatever now they are back in the village come and support them.

BERNARD CHAPMAN HONARARY ALDERMAN FOR COUNTY COUNCIL

For the first time in its history, Leicestershire County Council have appointed Honary Aldermen. Four former County Councillors which included Bernard Chapman, were appointed at a special meeting of the County Council on 13 July 2005. The title Honorary Alderman is only conferred on someone who, in the opinion of the Council, had provided emenient service as a past Member of that Council.

Bernard Chapman was first elected to the County Council for the Asfordby Division on 4 May 1989 and served on the County Council until May 2005. He was the Conservative Group Spokesman on the Arts Libraries and Museums Committee from 1995 to 1999 and the Community Services Scrutiny Committee from 2003 to 2005. He also served as the Conservative Whip from 1993 to 1995.

It's Your Parish

As I lay on my back looking up at a beautiful blue sky complete with a temperature that was just about perfect I thought to myself could life get any worse. I'd recently reached an age which I had always thought well beyond my expectation and yet still I wasn't particularly happy, it had made me realise that I was old, also what wasn't helping me very much was that the wooden steps that I'd been standing on only a second before had just collapsed, also due to old age. I lay there on my driveway with warm water from the bucket that I had been holding at the time trickling up one of my trouser legs, I wasn't sure what was trickling down the other one. While laying there unable to get up, but not wanting to be accused of doing nothing I decided to do something constructive, as men do, I watched the planes that were flying overhead going to Nottingham East Midlands Airport (NEMA) that, according to the Airport Authorities Consultation maps, indicated should have been passing over somewhere between Thrussington and Rotherby over Ragdale Hall and then turning left before they get to Old Dalby, into NEMA, but by flying over Asfordby which, now at times seems to be the norm; means no flying over Ragdale Hall and turn left over Old Dalby. I'm beginning to wonder if someone at that expensive health spa has friends in high places, perhaps the control tower at the airport. Just a thought! Late night freight flights seem particularly loud in the early hours of the morning and admitted to by the Airport Authorities as "teething problems". They are well below the 3000 feet that all flights should be at our distances from the airport, they often feel and sound so low when they pass over my house that I half expect to hear an explosion when they crash. None of this is good enough and we will try and find out why our air space is being violated. Will someone please come and help me up. I'm still here and she has just stepped over me again.

The Valley Flood Alleviation Scheme is now completed and as far as flood water from the Brook is concerned I'm sure that it will do the job. What we do need to be sure about now is that the old, and I do mean old, sewage system will be adequate although we have been assured by Severn Trent

THE BOROUGH YOUTH PLAY SCHEME

This was held for the first time in Asfordby. In 2004 the scheme was funded and organised by Borough Councillor Frank Moore-Coltman. This year it was for 1 week of afternoons and funded by the Borough and once again it was enjoyed very much by those who attended. There was, as last year, a shortage of girls although there was an occasional visit from a couple of mothers who joined in. Although the event was highlighted in the last issue of the Parish Magazine, more youngsters were expected. Those who did attend will, we are sure, be back again new year.

MINI RECYCLING STATION

The Mini Recycling Station has been removed from Bradgate Lane Car Park because it was considered that, in view of the Borough's new Recycling Scheme, there was no need for public recycling banks. We now have green and grey boxes that take all that was being banked at the Bradgate Lane site. The recycling bins were certainly not being emptied on a regular basis by Melton Borough Council and on the day the bank was removed it was overflowing and a general Health and Safety hazard. Anyone seen leaving rubbish at the site will be flytipping and prosecuted.

NEW BOROUGH RECYCLING SCHEME

The new Borough Recycling Scheme now seems generally to be working reasonably well and we would like to say well done and thank you to the people who cover Asfordby, they do take more than they should and we hope that they continue to remain so flexible. They are certainly more flexible than some of the officers at Melton Borough Council and it is very much appreciated. We as customers also have responsibilities not to take advantage of this flexibility. Unfortunately the bins outside the shops are not emptied often enough and this makes them a health hazard and the shop area very untidy.

ASFORDBY 1863

ASFORDBY, a village, consisting chiefly of one street, with several neat houses, on the North side of the navigable river Wreake, 3 miles West of Melton Mowbray has in its Parish 485 inhabitants, and 1483A, 3R, 13P of land, generally having a clayey soil and a flat surface.

The Rev. Frederick Geo. Burnaby B.A., is the Lord of the Manor and patron of the Rectory, valued in K.B. at £15.11s.7d, and now at £475. The Rev. John Martmell, M.A. is the incumbent and has a good residence, built in 1808, and 260 acres of glebe mostly allotted in lieu of tithes, at the enclosure, in 1761.

The Church (All Saints) has a tower, spire and five bells and was renovated in 1830. The north aisle was paved in 1827 at the expense of the late rector. Mrs. Burnaby has an estate here, and resides at Asfordby Hall, a large and handsome mansion, built in 1840, at a cost of about £4000, in the Italian style, of brick, cemented in imitation of stone. Wm Inett Esq, Mr Daniel Hall, Mr. Henry Houghton, Mrs. Stower and some smaller proprietors, have land in the parish.

The National School was built by the late Rector, in 1843, at a cost of £300; and a house for the master was built near it in 1859, by Miss C.C. Barnaby, at a cost of £250. The master has the dividends of £172.0s.10d, three-per-cent console, purchased with £100 left by Morris Cam in 1769; and the interest of £200 left by the late Rector, the Rev. Andrew Burnaby in 1857. The poor have the interest of £40 left by one Humberstone; and of £20 left by the Rev. Andrew Burnaby in 1776. The Wesleyans and Primitive Methodists have small chapels here, the latter built in 1840, and former in 1838.

There were 3 Inns - The Blue Bell, the Crown and The Horseshoes. Letters arrived from Melton at 8.30 am and were collected at 5.00 pm (Extract from History, Gazetteer and Directory of the Counties of Leicestershire and Rutland, published in 1863)
